

A PASSION FOR CORNISH ART: 50 YEARS OF PRIVATE COLLECTING II OCTOBER 2023 - 13 JANUARY 2024

Our autumn show focuses on private collectors and the important role they play in helping to form exhibitions. A Passion for Cornish Art showcases part of the collection of John and the late Pep Branfield, who, over the past 50 years, have amassed over 150 paintings and ceramics by artists and potters working in Cornwall.

Initially collecting paintings by Newlyn School artists such as Stanhope Forbes, Charles Simpson and Thomas Cooper Gotch, the Branfields' interest then moved on to St Ives artists including Robert Borlase Smart, John Anthony Park, and works by St Ives Modernists such as John Wells, Wilhelmina Barns-Graham, Terry Frost and Bryan Wynter. In later years, paintings by Roger Hilton, Rose Hilton and Paul Feiler were added to the collection. Throughout this period, the Branfields continued to collect the work of artist friend Tony Giles and, in fact, the very first and very last paintings acquired were by him.

For over twenty-five years, Penlee House have been borrowing works from private collectors such as the Branfields for inclusion in our exhibitions, and regular visitors to the Gallery will recognise many of the paintings in this show. As well as being the last chance to see these paintings

together as a curated collection, this exhibition aims to highlight the important relationship that Penlee House Gallery & Museum has with private collectors in order to stage interesting and relevant exhibitions celebrating the wealth of artistic talent in Cornwall, and help make previously unseen paintings more accessible to the wider public.

This exhibition is sponsored by Lay's Auctioneers. The Branfield Collection will be offered at auction in February 2024 by Lay's Auctioneers.

Katie Herbert, Curator/Deputy Director, said "We are so grateful to John and Pip for loaning so many of their incredible pieces over the years. This exhibition is a fantastic opportunity to see their collection all together for one last time".

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LATEST ACQUISITIONS



The latest acquisition to Penlee's collection comes courtesy of long-time benefactor, George Bednar. This 1908 painting by Lamorna Birch is the fifty-second item given by George since his first donation of a drypoint engraving by Elizabeth Forbes (the first of many) back in 1995.

Artists Painting in the Lamorna Woods, which was included in the recent Lamorna Colony Pioneers exhibition, features Birch's wife and eldest daughter, Houghton and Mornie, sitting with their dog, whilst being painted by two artists believed to be Harold and Laura Knight. For those of you who visited the summer exhibition, you will have seen the Laura Knight portrait of Mornie, wearing the same outfit and holding a doll. A small painting by Harold Knight, once belonging to Mornie and sold at auction in 1999, depicts her in the same attire, also holding the doll.

It is a beautiful addition to the collections and we are very grateful to George for all his generous support over the years.

The Friends Committee have been busy purchasing items for Penlee's collections this year. In the Spring, we acquired a watercolour by William Wainwright entitled *Mental Arithmetic*, depicting an old sea dog in a sail loft counting coins. Wainwright first visited Newlyn in 1881, following in fellow Birmingham artist Walter Langley's footsteps. He returned in 1883, staying in the village for two years, therefore dating this painting to the early 1880s. It will go on display early next year, once it has undergone conservation treatment.

As well as paintings, the Friends have also acquired two pieces of studio pottery by renowned potter William Marshall.

The first, a lidded ginger jar, was purchased by the Committee and the second, a bottle vase with tenmoku glaze was donated by the vendor. Both will be on display in the autumn exhibition.

MASTER PLAN AND FORWARD PLAN ANNA RENTON, DIRECTOR

Penzance Council is developing a Masterplan for Penlee House to create a more sustainable organisation, so we can continue to preserve the artefacts in our collection and inspire generations to come.

Our priorities are to:

- · Reduce the environmental impact of the building
- Increase revenue generation through improved catering and retail facilities
- Improve visitor facilities (e.g. toilets)
- Increase gallery space to display collections
- Create a new fit-for-purpose learning centre
- Increase storage capacity for collections.

Towards achieving this, we are undertaking the following work in the next six months:

- I. Applying for funding to enable the café to move to the Coach House. If successful, the released space in the former café will be repurposed for retail space. Together, this project will generate more income for the café and provide commercial opportunities for local artists.
- 2. Commissioning specialist engineering reports to understand how to lower our energy usage, especially regarding our ageing air conditioning plant.

The Forward Plan is under development and will need to identify funding sources for each stage of the Masterplan.

CHARITABLE INCORPORATED ORGANISATION STATUS AND THE FRIENDS

The Friends of Penlee House is registered as an unincorporated charity which means it is not a legal entity in its own right. This has not hindered our work in the past but it has become increasingly clear over recent months that it will not enable the Friends to provide the support which Penlee House will require going forward.

An ambitious new masterplan to ensure the future success and sustainability of Penlee House is being developed by the Town Council working in partnership with the Friends.

To ensure that we are able to effectively support Penlee House in the implementation of this plan the Trustees and the Committee of the Friends are proposing that the Friends become a Charitable Incorporated Organisation or CIO. This would allow us to enter into contracts, make funding bids in our own right, employ staff and own property. Many other museums and Friends organisations have taken this path already.

Becoming a CIO would not change the character of the Friends as a membership-led organisation with elected trustees.


You will receive more information about this proposal over the coming months. The decision about the Friends becoming a CIO will be taken at the AGM in June 2024.
